Covid-19 response

- Reached out to partner publishers asking to provide access to e-resources via username and password
- Informed members about remote access solutions
- Wrote proposal to a donor for funding to assist libraries to assist with remote access solutions to licenced eresources, but was not successful
- Renewed agreement for RemoteXs and MyLOFT solutions
- This remains a priority and we are exploring other possibilities f.ex. eduGAIN
- Shared information about content made freely available by publishers during the pandemic, both Covid-19 related and general content
- Negotiating with publishers for no price increase to eresources for 2021






2019 usage and savings statistics of licensed e-resources

- 6.4 million full text articles downloaded
- Saved approx. \$504M in subscription fees
- 98% average discount on list price
- Statistics on intranet and emailed to coordinators





Note: the number of publishers and countries varies from year to year



Global move to accelerate the transition to open access via transformative agreements

Collaboration with OA2020, Plan S & ICOLC

- Awareness raising and capacity building of our coordinators to negotiate their own transformative agreements, such as 'publish and read' agreements
- Negotiating open access publishing terms on behalf of authors in EIFL countries

Build capacity of EIFL Licensing Coordinators

- Educational webinars: <u>Monitoring the cost of publishing in open access</u> (Stockholm University); <u>Subscription</u>
 <u>cancellations and alternative access options</u> (OA2020 & Bibsam); <u>Pursuing open an Iowa State University</u>
- EIFL recommendations to countries when negotiating direct agreements with journal publishers, including publish & read / transformative agreements



Negotiating free/discounted APCs for authors or read & publish offers

Barriers to authors in EIFL countries publishing in open access

- The cost of Article Processing Charges (APCs)
- Changes in eligibility of APC waivers or discounts
- APC waivers and discounts not being available for hybrid journals, where choosing subscription option is easier
- Not being aware of APC waivers or discounts being available (no automatic recognition)



Aims for open access agreements with publishers

- APC discounts & waivers fixed in a contract term
- Including as many countries as possible even those that would be excluded from sales deals because of local agents
- Open to all institutions, not just those with active subscriptions
- Include fully open access journals and hybrid journals during the period of transition
- Automatic recognition of authors no need for a discount code


